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

Co-Planning and Co-Teaching through Cognitive Coaching

PATTI BROSNAN serves as the Executive Director of the Mathematics Coaching Program and helped develop the Co-Planning and Co-Teaching Apprenticeship for Learning model for pre-service and inservice teachers based on her research at Ohio State University







"Challenging Inequality: The Role of Teacher Educators" Susan Neuman, Professor of Early Childhood and Literacy Education, New York University Steinhardt School

SUSAN NEUMAN is a specialist in early literacy development; whose research and teaching interests include early childhood policy, curriculum, and early reading instruction for children who live in poverty. In her role as the U.S. Assistant Secretary for Elementary and Secondary Education, Neuman established the Early Reading First program, developed the Early Childhood Educator Professional Development Program, and was responsible for all activities in Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Act. She has written more than 100 articles, and authored and edited eleven books, including the three volume *Handbook of Early Literacy Research* (Guilford Press), *Changing the Odds for Children at Risk* (Teachers College Press, 2009), *Educating the Other America* (Brookes, 2008), *Multimedia and Literacy Development* (Taylor & Francis, 2008), and *Giving Our Children a Fighting Chance: Poverty Literacy, and the Development of Information Capital.* (Teachers College Press, 2012). Her most recent book is *All About Words: Increasing Vocabulary in the Common Core Classroom, Pre-k Through Grade 2* (Teachers College Press, 2013). She received her doctorate from University of the Pacific, Stockton, California.



Giving Our Children A Fighting Chance offers a compelling, eye-opening portrait of two communities in Philadelphia with drastically different economic resources. Over the course of their 10-year investigation—from 1998 to 2009—authors Susan Neuman and Donna Celano came to understand that this disparity between affluence and poverty has created a knowledge gap—far more important than mere achievement scores—with serious implications for students' economic prosperity and social mobility. At the heart of this knowledge gap is the limited ability of students from poor communities to develop information capital. This moving book takes you into the communities in question to meet the students and their families, and by doing so provides powerful insights into the role that literacy can play in giving low-income students a fighting chance. 

Valid and Reliable Instruments for Educator Preparation (VARI-EP) will present "Developing Valid and Reliable Instruments for your Clinical Practice"

ERICA BROWNSTEIN is the Assistant Dean of Educator Preparation at The Ohio State University and was previously an associate professor at Capital University. Dr. Brownstein has extensive experience with the educator preparation accreditation process, accreditation assessment development and data analysis, and program improvements based on data results. She has served as the NCATE SPA Coordinator for NSTA and is an expert at working with IHE's across the nation to develop efficient and effective processes for assessment development and program improvement. Dr. Brownstein is also known for providing mentorship to graduate students and emerging scholars who aspire to obtain leadership positions in higher education.



KRISTALL DAY'S research focuses on instructional practices in special education and teacher preparation. Some of Dr. Day's projects include strategies for increasing maintenance and generalization of preservice teacher knowledge in the field and measurement of preservice teacher performance. Additionally, she regularly presents at state and national conferences on topics related to teacher preparation. Dr. Day currently serves as the edTPA coordinator and Special Education faculty at The Ohio State University.

JANINE DENT, better known as "Nina", has been a part of the Educator Preparation unit of The Ohio State University for the past twelve years. She is well versed in the process for clinical field placements and has established relationships with the districts. Nina developed the iTunes U courses, Module I: Ohio-specific standards and requirements and is coordinating Module II: Dyslexia. Outside of her work at Ohio State, Nina is heavily involved in the sport of gymnastics as a coach, National rated official, and serves as the State of Ohio Chairman, and Regional Committee member.
