Nicole Garcia focuses on the design and implementation of practice-based approaches to the professional training of K-12 teachers. At TeachingWorks, she leads the mathematics team's development of assessments, curricular materials, and multimedia supports for mathematics teacher educators. In addition, she directs the Elementary Mathematics Laboratory, including overseeing the design and enactment of practice-based professional development for teacher candidates, practicing teachers, and teacher educators. An experienced secondary mathematics teacher, Nicole brings expertise in working with students who have not been successful in school mathematics. She taught at an award-winning Middle/Early College that is highly successful in supporting the mathematics learning of such students. In past work, Nicole directed a regional mathematics and science center, provided professional development to K-12 mathematics teachers, and facilitated state-wide education projects. Meghan Shaughnessy is an elementary teacher educator and researcher at the University of Michigan School of Education. Her research focuses on the study and improvement of elementary mathematics instruction. In one area of work, she focuses on development and study of practice-intensive approaches that support the development of mathematical knowledge for teaching along with teaching practices that support student learning, and deliberateness in promoting equity. Meghan was involved in the school-wide project at the University of Michigan to redesign teacher education. Meghan leads the planning group for the elementary mathematics methods course for undergraduates and mentors graduate students in learning to teach the course. Since 2013, she has co-directed an NSF-funded project to develop and study simulations of teaching practice as sites for assessing skill with core teaching practices. She has also served as a senior investigator on the Developing Teaching Expertise @ Mathematics Project an NSF-funded materials development project, which is building practice-focused and mathematics-intensive professional development. A second area of work focuses on mathematics instructional practice. Since 2005, she has been involved with the Elementary Mathematics Laboratory, including designing the instruction with Deborah Ball. From a research perspective, she is investigating a particular component of teaching, the work of anticipating and designing for the content-based interactions that occur during a lesson. In past work, she has studied the development of children's mathematical thinking about hard-to-learn and hard-to-teach topics, such as fractions. Meghan co-wrote the book Beyond Pizzas and Pies: 10 Essential Strategies for Supporting Fraction Sense, published by Math Solutions in 2010. At TeachingWorks, Meghan works on the mathematics team, contributing to assessment and curriculum development. She received a PhD in mathematics education from the University of California, Berkeley and a BA in mathematics and psychology from Wellesley College.






