Jennifer DePaoli

Keynote Thursday, October 20, 2022 9:00 am



Jennifer DePaoli is a Senior Researcher and Director of the Whole Child Policy Table at the Learning Policy Institute. She also co-leads the Whole Child Education team, focusing on students' social and emotional learning and wellbeing, the science of learning and development, and putting the whole child at the center of policy and practice. DePaoli brings with her more than a decade of experience teaching and conducting research and policy analysis in K–12 education. She began her career teaching middle grade students and later taught courses in educational foundations to pre-service teachers at the University of Akron and Ohio State University. Prior to joining LPI, DePaoli served

as the Senior Research & Policy Advisor at Civic Enterprises, where she led research on raising high school graduation rates and increasing college readiness, social and emotional learning, and alternative school accountability systems. Before that, she conducted school choice and charter school policy research at Policy Matters Ohio. DePaoli earned her Ph.D. in Education Policy from Ohio State University. She also holds a Master's in Middle Childhood Education and a B.A. in Communications from the University of Dayton.

Recent syntheses of research in neuroscience, the developmental and learning sciences, and fields like anthropology, sociology, and social psychology and its implications for educational practice, point to a need for important transformations in teaching practice to ensure children experience the secure relationships, skillful teaching, and personalized supports that will enable healthy, whole child development. Keynote Friday, October 21, 2022 8:00 am



Jennifer Vargo is the director of the Office of Whole Child Supports at the Ohio Department of Education. In this role, Jennifer leads the Department's strategies on meeting the needs of the whole child, which include health, mental and behavioral health, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports, social-emotional learning and school climate. Her office also administers programs that support vulnerable youth populations, including students experiencing homelessness, youth in foster care, English learners and justice-involved youth.

Prior to the Department of Education, Jennifer worked as a school principal in an urban, high-

poverty, elementary school. She returned to the Department in August 2019, having previously spent 10 years leading its school improvement efforts as the director of the Office of Innovation and Improvement and as a School Improvement Transformation specialist. She also led the Department's family and community engagement policies and programs. Jennifer was a Bright Fellow and received her MBA and school administration coursework from The Ohio State University's Fisher College of Business. She also holds a Master's in Social Work from The Ohio State University and Bachelor of Arts from Denison University.
