



Celebrating Success and Innovation in P-12 Schools: A Panel





How Does Ohio Compare on Metrics Capturing the State of the Teacher Workforce?

What does national data indicate about the state of the teacher workforce in the United States, and how does Ohio compare? In this presentation, researchers from Learning Policy Institute will share findings from the State of the Teacher Workforce interactive map, which was released in July 2023. They will discuss the extent to which Ohio has attractive teaching conditions conducive to recruiting and retaining teachers, whether teachers are equitably distributed across schools, and other state and national trends that may influence teacher supply and demand.


