John Carey was appointed Chancellor of the Ohio Department of Higher Education by Gov. John R. Kasich in April, 2013. As Chancellor, Carey oversees the state's public two-year and four-year institutions and Ohio Technical Centers, provides policy guidance to the Governor and the Ohio General Assembly, and carries out state higher education policy.

Prior to his appointment as Chancellor, Carey served as Assistant to the President for Government Relations and Strategic Initiatives for Shawnee State University in Portsmouth.

Since being appointed Chancellor, Carey's priorities have revolved around collaborating with Ohio's higher education partners to make postsecondary education affordable and accessible for all students. Partnerships with Ohio's public and private colleges and universities, career technical centers and Aspire adult basic education sites have helped increase retention numbers on Ohio campuses as well as the number of Ohioans with a college degree or certificate. Other statewide collaborations have enhanced services to veterans and service members, bolstered workforce development efforts, launched a performance-based funding system, and raised awareness of the need to address sexual violence on Ohio's campuses.

Brian Yusko teaches graduate and undergraduate courses in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis on middle grades teaching in urban settings. His research focuses on teacher learning, specifically on professional development opportunities that help teachers learn to design and deliver student-centered instruction. Dr. Yusko has designed Video CD-ROMs for instructional materials in undergraduate teacher education courses and developed online versions of EDB 200 and EDB 612. He currently is researching the uses of video for teacher learning and mentoring. As part of this, he is involved in the revision of the current college portfolio system and the pilot of the new statewide Teacher Performance Assessment.

Kristien Zenkov is a professor of literacy education at George Mason University and the co-director of the "Through Students Eyes" project, which asks diverse high school and middle school youth to document with photographs and writing what they believe are the purposes of school. He received his PhD in Teacher Education from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and was a faculty member at Cleveland State University before coming to George Mason.

While at Cleveland State, Dr. Zenkov served as the Director of the Master of Urban Secondary Teaching (MUST) Program—an award-winning urban and social justice focused masters licensure option—and coordinated partnerships with high schools in four urban school districts.




